Rev. Rodney Lemery Associate Minister



When I reflect on what it means to work for justice, I remember that it calls us to act to mitigate suffering both immediately and keep our eye trained on the systemic origins of the suffering itself. In our congregation, I have seen how we live out this calling. Often, we begin with a small act of charity and, as time passes, see it grow into relationships that transform our community and us.

I think of the times we have gathered hygiene kits for Trinity Center or shared our Sunday offering with Child Advocates of Contra Costa County (CASA). In those moments, we are meeting real, urgent needs. The unhoused person gets a fresh pair of socks and a meal. A child in the foster care system is connected to an advocate who will stand by their side in court. I am reminded in these situations that sometimes, dignity cannot wait for the world to actually change.

Still, I have learned that charity alone can keep us apart. It can create a barrier between the giver and the receiver. It lets us stay comfortable, watching others' pain instead of being truly empathetic neighbors who find a bit of ourselves in the stranger's story.

What truly makes a difference is building relationships. I have seen this in our work with HOPE Solutions. We started by collecting cash and holiday gift donations and preparing holiday meals for this incredible housing advocacy group. Soon after these efforts were underway, our relationship evolved into real conversations. Now, we are even imagining what it would look like to open our campus for housing in our county with their support. We moved from asking, 'What can we give?' to asking, 'What can we create together?'

Charity can be seen as an invitation, not a conclusion. When we give, we open ourselves to meeting people who are different from us. These meetings challenge our assumptions and show us our shared humanity. From there, we can address the deeper injustices that made charity necessary in the first place. We need both the food pantry and advocacy for housing justice. Our hearts must move into compassion, and our minds need to be prepared to do the hard work of changing systems.

Justice asks us to show up in the moment and to stay for the long haul, to offer what we have, and to build relationships that last. This is how we move from charity to true solidarity, from simply helping to working for liberation, from good intentions to the beloved community we dream about.

However you find your way into our important justice work, I am excited to walk this path toward justice with you as we start the new year!

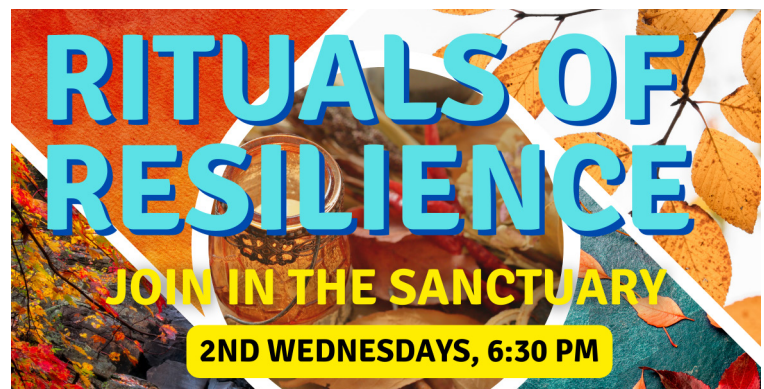

Each year the MDUUC Nominating Committee works diligently to identify members who are interested in getting involved and serving our church community through positions on the Board of Trustees, Legacy Committee, or Nominating Committee.

What do these jobs entail?

The Board of Trustees is the governing body of MDUUC. Trustees are active in the life of the congregation and ensure that the church's activities and assets support our mission and values. They reach out to the larger congregation to gather recommendations for potential candidates and engage in robust discussion to determine a slate of nominees to be voted on at the Annual Meeting. 2-year terms, may serve for 2 consecutive terms.
